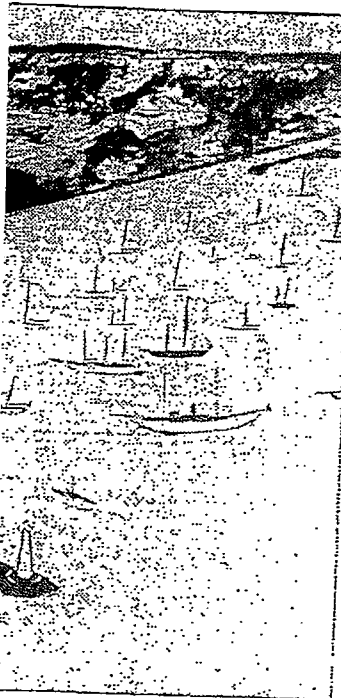


Harwich Harbor

Own Board Sues Teacher

DAMAGES ARE AWARDED FOUR

\$928 Granted in Suits Seeking Total of \$10,000

BARNSTABLE, Dec. 14.—Sealed verdicts awarding four plaintiffs damages totaling \$928 in their suits against Horatio Duquette, Hyannis druggist, were announced today in Superior Court when Judge David F. Dillon opened the seals as court resumed after the weekend recess.

The cases went to the jury shortly after noon Friday but the verdicts were not returned until five hours later.

Growing out of an auto accident June 4, 1935, at the intersection of South and Pine Streets, Hyannis, the suits were brought by Samuel R. Leeman of West Barnstable for \$5,000; his father, Victor Leeman of West Barnstable, for \$1,000; Samuel M. Sarkinen of Centerville for \$3,000; and his mother, Mrs. Ida Sarkinen for \$1,000.

The Leemans were awarded \$600 on one count and \$128 on another while the Sarkinens received \$200 on a single count. Leeman and Sarkinens, both minors, claimed damages for injuries which they received in the crash when a car driven by Duquette allegedly ran into their machine, driven by Sarkinen with Leeman as a passenger. Paul M. Swift and Daniel Fern appeared for the plaintiffs.

Trial of four other suits, which also grew out of an auto accident, was resumed today with the introduction of testimony by witnesses. The suits, naming Manuel L. Turner of Falmouth, defendant, are brought in connection with an auto collision between cars driven by Turner

Neediest Families of Cape Will Get Aid All Through Winter

Christmas Fund Will Help Most Destitute Not For A Day, But Through The Hardest Months Of Year Ahead; Your Contributions Are Needed.

Believe it or not there is destitution on Cape Cod.

Realizing the Christmas spirit will provide for needy families on Christmas Day, The Cape Cod Standard-Times announces its first annual Neediest Families Fund to help at least ten deserving families on the Cape.

The drive to raise funds begins today and will end Christmas Day. Contributions, large or small, will be acknowledged by The Standard-Times. Persons desiring to contribute to this cause may mail their donations to The Cape Cod Standard-Times or leave them at the office in Hyannis.

The Cape Cod Standard-Times opens the campaign with a contribution of \$25.

Contributions may be cash or orders on dealers and merchants for groceries, fuel or clothing. The list of contributors and their donations will be published daily.

The number of families the Neediest Families Fund will be able to help, and the extent to which they will be helped, depends entirely on the generosity of more fortunate Cape Cod families.

The Neediest Families to benefit from this fund are being selected with the cooperation of town and county Welfare agencies and others who are acquainted with the plight of these families.

Every cent or order contributed, from the few pennies given by children to substantial contributions from those who are able to give more freely, will be applied to the direct aid of the families chosen.

The money will be carefully expended for absolute necessities, such as food, medical treatment, clothing and fuel. No cash will be given. The supplies will be allocated according to the needs of each family and the response to this appeal.

The Neediest Families Fund is designed to carry these families through the Winter or as long as the money lasts. It is not a one-day remembrance of the needy but a continued aid which will help better their living conditions and make their lives more cheerful. In some cases the Neediest Families Fund will fill emergency agencies to help families who are reluctant to accept Welfare aid.

Families in comfortable circumstances may not realize the destitution of their neighbors. Proud Cape Codders are inclined to present smiling faces to the world despite privation in their homes.

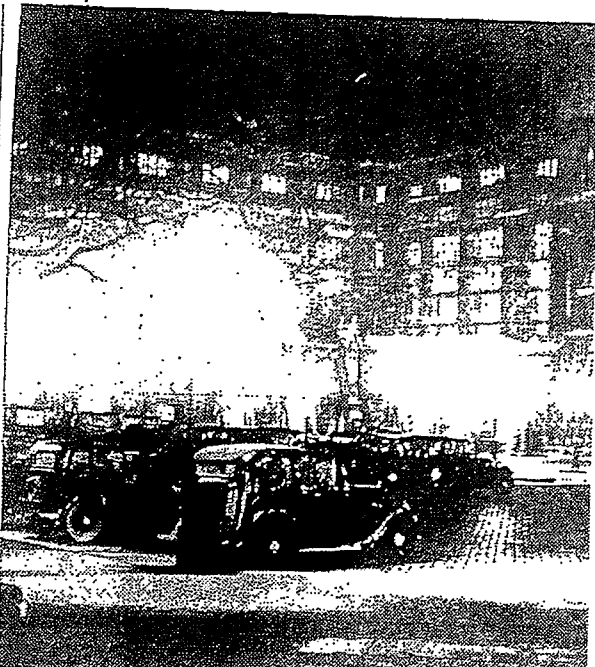
It is to help families like this the Neediest Families Fund is founded: A crippled father on the lower Cape with four children, ranging from 18 months to six years, can find little means to support his family during the long Winter months. He was injured while working a few years ago and his insurance income is a pittance compared to the needs of his family. Unable to walk any great distance, he has an old, battered car which he uses to obtain odd jobs when and if he can get employment permitted by his handicapped physical condition. When cold weather arrived the oldest daughter was ill and could not attend school in her shabby coat.

There are many families such as this one struggling through life, noticed only by their few friends and neighbors, or Welfare agencies. The Neediest Families Fund proposes to lend a helping hand to as many of them as the amount raised will permit.

Pocasset Station Is Broken Into, Robbed

POCASSET, Dec. 14.—The railroad station here was broken into and robbed of a small sum in change and some candies over the weekend, Bourne Police learned early today.

The break was discovered by Station Agent Andrew Angus about midnight when he went to his office. The thieves, entered the station through a window and broke down the inner office door with a crowbar.

The police said \$1.89 in pennies was taken from the office till which had been left unlocked and some additional change was taken from a candy machine which was smashed. A bunch of keys which had been left in the office were also stolen.

The ticket container was broken into but an early checkup by Mr. Angus showed no missing tickets. Likewise, the robbers opened several express packages but did not take any of the contents. The police are convinced the break was committed by more than one person. There is no safe in the office and no large sums of money had been left in the place, the police said.
